The Tragedy of Macbeth (commonly called *Macbeth*) is a play written by William Shakespeare. It is considered one of his darkest and most powerful tragedies. Set in Scotland, the play dramatizes the effects produced when the Scottish lord Macbeth, chooses evil as the way to fulfill his ambition for power.



He murders King Duncan, to become king himself and then goes on a reign of murderous terror to stay in power, eventually sending the country into civil war. In the end he loses everything that gives meaning and purpose to his life before losing his life itself.

The play is believed to have been written between 1603 and 1607, and is most commonly dated 1606. The earliest account of a performance is in April 1611, when Simon Forman recorded seeing such a play at the Globe Theatre. It was first published in 1622.

Macbeth is Shakespeare's shortest and bloodiest tragedy, and tells the story of a brave Scottish general named Macbeth who receives a prophecy from a trio of witches that one day he'll become King of Scotland. Consumed by ambition and spurred to action by his wife, Macbeth murders King Duncan and takes the throne for himself.

His reign is racked with guilt and paranoia, and he soon commits more and more murders to protect himself. The bloodbath swiftly takes Macbeth and Lady Macbeth into periods of arrogance, madness and eventually death, as he is defeated and killed on the battlefield by Macduff, allowing the new king, Malcolm, to take the throne.
